NDAL SUMMER EDUCATION SERIES

THE AHS IS extending cosponsorship of educational programming offered through **New Directions in the American Landscape (NDAL)**. The NDAL's Summer

Education Series, which runs from June through August, features a blend of virtual and in-person programs presented by well-known landscape designers, horticulturists, and ecologists. Among them are **Darrel Morrison, Piet Oudolf, Veronica Tyson Strait, Gerould Wilhelm, Angela Kyle, and Larry Weaner**, who is NDAL's founder. Some will present virtually on the artistic, social, and ecological considerations that can inform landscape design. Others will guide hands-on "In the Field" sessions at a variety of regional locations to observe and analyze the real world results of various ecology-based landscape approaches. In the Field locations include Madison, Wisconsin; Framingham, Massachusetts; St. Louis, Missouri; Garrison, New York; Sparta, Tennessee; and Stafford, Virginia.

creased awareness of horticulture and floriculture and inspire more people to pursue careers working with flowers and plants.

MacDonald reports that Seed Your Future has several new initiatives planned for 2022, including adding a job board aggregator that will connect job seekers interested in plant careers with plant industry job openings; conducting an industry salary survey so job seekers understand the wage ranges across industry sectors and positions; partnering with colleges and universities to inform high school and middle school teachers about career exploration and education opportunities in green industry sectors; and hosting the fifth year of the Plant Mash-up contest for middle-schoolers across the country. This contest gives students the opportunity to see themselves as problem-solvers, learn they can impact their community, and have fun with plants and flowers.
