KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Cultivating Community through Gardening

Chris Battle, Knoxville community leader Pastor, will share about his journey to create BattleField Farms & Gardens, which, with its city-wide network, addresses food justice issues and provides hundreds of underserved households with gardengrown produce. His project is an inspiring example of how gardening can cultivate community at both small and large scales. Battle will offer guidance for how attendees can identify needs in their own communities and organize to address those needs through gardening. Chris Battle is a native of Cincinnati, Ohio, whose life trajectory changed when he began a community garden across the street from Tabernacle Baptist Church where he served as pastor. With that garden, he started understanding the effect of food disparity in his community. In addition to starting a farmers' market at Tabernacle Baptist Church, Battle works with other churches seeking to establish gardens on their grounds and has recently begun utilizing a food truck to distribute fresh excess product to underserved communities. Pastor Battle has served as the Co-President of Justice Knox, and as a representative of Creation Care to the national organization on how environmental issues affect our community lives. He presently is the Lead Pastor of the Harvest Fellowship and he and his wife, Tomma, are the parents of 19 children.



Inspiring and Nurturing Future Gardeners

Michael Craig, Special Education Teacher and Horticulture Program Director, winner of the AHS Jane L. Taylor Award, will share the innovative techniques designed to accommodate students with disabilities. Using differentiated methods and adaptive equipment carefully chosen for the students, these techniques are specialized to provide each student the opportunity to participate and gain valuable vocational horticulture skills leading to possible employment. Winner of the 2021 Grand Prize National Magna Award, this comprehensive program showcases the transition process through hands-on experiences producing food products for fine dining establishments in Detroit, retail outlets, food pantry donations and sale at our nation's largest and oldest food hub, Eastern Market. He will highlight the techniques and plans for creating what is the nation's largest Farm to School/Table program, including the development of corporate and educational partners to aid and maintain the program's viability and sustainability, obtaining grant funds, and staff/community involvement. Craig is a special education teacher and horticulture program instructor at the Charles R. Drew Transition Center in the Detroit Public School Community District in Michigan, where he runs and supervises the Gardens at Drew.

GROWING GOOD KIDS BOOK AWARD

The recipients of the 2023 "Growing Good Kids — Excellence in Children's Literature" awards will be announced Thursday during lunch. Presented jointly by the National Junior Master Gardener Program and the American Horticultural Society, these awards recognize engaging and inspiring works of plant-, garden-, and ecology-themed children's literature. The Growing Good Kids — Excellence in Children's Literature awards are presented annually to qualifying titles published in the previous year.



JANE L. TAYLOR AWARD RECIPIENT: MICHAEL CRAIG

The American Horticultural Society's Jane L. Taylor Award recognizes an individual, organization, or program that has inspired and nurtured future horticulturalists through efforts in children's and youth gardening. This year, AHS is proud to honor Michael Craig with the Jane L. Taylor Award, part of the AHS's annual Great American Gardener Awards. A special education teacher and horticulture program instructor at the Charles R. Drew Transition Center in the Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD) in Michigan, Michael runs and supervises the Gardens at Drew that have become a national model of excellence for its interactive teaching methods and community outreach programs. In addition, he leads the Science/Food Nutrition/School Horticulture curriculum to support school garden programs and gardening curricula at 82 DPSCD elementary and middle schools. Michael Craig is the closing keynote speaker for this year's NCYGS.

The 2023 Symposium Sessions will be held in partnership with the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture, at the University of Tennessee's beautiful Student Union. The Biltmore Estate, designed by Frederick Law Olmsted and spanning 8,000 acres is considered America's first managed forest. In the afternoon we will explore The North Carolina Arboretum, a 434-acre public garden situated in the Southern Appalachian Mountains that offers extensive cultivated landscapes featuring the region's diverse plants. This full-day trip departs from Knoxville at 7:30 a.m. and returns at 5:30 p.m.

Select <u>one</u> of the following tours to get a closer look at garden spaces around Knoxville, Tennessee. Included in full symposium and Friday registration, transportation provided to and from for all attendees

Community Farm

This tour will visit CAC Beardsley Community Farm, which provides culturally relevant produce, accessible education, and land and resources for gardening. Beardsley manages 30 community garden sites, grows 10,000 pounds of produce each year, coordinates a food pantry, offers services for refugees and seniors, and holds gardening classes for youth. The tour will additionally visit two of the South Knoxville school farms that Beardsley manages: Dogwood Elementary School and South Knoxville Elementary School.

School Gardens

This tour will visit the Episcopal School of Knoxville and Hardin Valley Academy Elementary School in the far western reaches of Knoxville. The Episcopal School, which highlights outdoor engagement in its curriculum, demonstrates the range of school garden biodiversity possibilities, from tree scanning to rain collection to animal and pollinator monitoring. Hardin Valley Academy, which is maintained in collaboration with master gardeners, explores different approaches to garden design (such as emphasizing accessibility, colors, and the senses), as well as to the science of composting and plant life cycles.

Urban Parks

This tour will visit the Ijams Nature Center and Lakeshore Park along the Tennessee River. Ijams Nature Center encourages stewardship of the natural world by providing an urban greenspace for people to learn about and enjoy the outdoors through engaging experiences. It showcases over 300 acres of conserved land and counts among its uses a nature preschool and a playscape restoration. Lakeshore Park is a 185-acre general recreation public park that is enjoyed by a million visitors every year. It features an accessible woodland play area, a demonstration vegetable garden, wildflower plantings, and beautiful views of the Smoky Mountains.
