SUCCESSFUL SYMPOSIUM

In July, the American Horticultural Society held its 31st annual National Children & Youth Garden Symposium in Knoxville, Tennessee, in partnership with the University of Tennessee Gardens, Knoxville. The theme, "Cultivating Community," examined ways that gardening both relies on and creates community.

The four-day professional development event attracted youth garden educators from 34 states and Canada, as well as from a diversity of non-profits, K-12 schools, universities, and more. With the majority of attendees each affecting more than 1,000 young people (and some attendees affecting as many as 3.3 million!), this train-the-trainer symposium offered very broad national outreach.





AHS BOARD UPDATES

Following the AHS Board of Directors meeting in July, we are pleased to announce the election of three new Board members: Doug Barker, Dr. Larry Deaven, and Philip Tabas. Another Board change is that Jane Diamantis, a longtime Board member from Tennessee, announced she is stepping down. "Jane has given generously of her time and talent, and supported AHS in many significant ways," says AHS President Suzanne Laporte. "We are incredibly grateful for all she has done for AHS over the years, especially for her strong belief in the importance of this organization and her willingness to ensure that it serves more gardeners across the country."

Barker is a strategic advisor for Barker & Scott Consulting, which assists nonprofit organizations with leveraging the power of information technology for organizational advancement and mission success. Prior to co-founding Barker & Scott, he was vice president and CIO for the Nature Conservancy. A resident of Washington, D.C., he is active in local environmental causes including an initiative in his community to remove invasive plants and restore ecological health through planting native plants.

Deaven is a distinguished scientist with a lifelong passion for horticulture. After retiring as director of the Center for Human Genome Studies at the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico, he has recently volunteered to help develop extensive gardens at the Pajarito Environmental Education Center near his home in New Mexico. A member of numerous specialty plant societies, he has a particular interest in Clematis, Penstemon, and Agastache. A longtime AHS traveler and supporter, Deaven has written an article on penstemons for *The American Gardener* (July/August 2021).

Tabas is special advisor with the North American Conservation Region of the Nature Conservancy (TNC) based in Arlington, Virginia. As TNC's longtime general counsel, he was involved in numerous land conservation, water resource protection and compatible economic development projects. He has served on boards for several nonprofits, is a co-author of the book Comprehensive Planning and the Environment,
