CHILDREN'S LIBRARY OPENS AT RIVER FARM

In early June, dozens of young visitors joined us to celebrate the reopening of the Children's Nature Library and Reading Room at our River Farm headquarters. The opening day activities included face painting, story time, and interactive crafts

for young children. This dynamic space for young readers, which was closed during the pandemic, will once again offer an extraordinary collection of over 1,700 books focused on nature and gardening. The library will be open from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. every Saturday through August 24.

The reading room houses over 1,700 books, many of which are part of the **Jane L. Taylor** book collection.

Taylor established the Michigan 4-H Children's Garden at Michigan State University, the first children's garden in North America, among other achievements.

The library's reopening was made possible by generous grants from **Dominion Energy** and the **Ruppert Family Foundation**. "We are incredibly grateful for the support of Dominion Energy and the Ruppert Family Foundation, whose contributions have been instrumental in bringing this beloved library back to life," says **Katie Tukey**, AHS Director of Development and Engagement.

The library will also host engaging programs for children, including story time and activities inspired by Plant Heroes, a website that provides nature-based educational programming for K–5 children. Local residents interested in sharing their love of nature with the next generation are welcome to volunteer in the new library. Volunteers will help with opening and closing, leading story time, creating fun educational programs, organizing and shelving books, and more.

The library is also accepting children's book donations to expand the current collection. CHANGES TO AHS BOARD OF DIRECTORS

AHS President **Suzanne Laporte** announced that longtime Board member and former chair **Marcia Zech** rotated off the Board at the end of the organization's fiscal year in June, and **James P. Folsom**, PhD. of Eastpoint, Florida, is joining the Board starting in July.

Zech, who lives in Mercer Island, Washington, has been on the AHS Board for 13 years. She played an active role on several Board committees and served as chair of the Board from 2021–2022. An avid gardener, Zech is also active in many civic and cultural organizations in her Washington community. Over the years, she and her

husband, **Klaus**, have been regular participants in the AHS Travel Study Program and prominent supporters of the annual Gala and other AHS programs.

"Marcia's impact on the AHS can't be overstated," says Laporte. "As a Board member, she gave generously of her time and stepped in to help financially at critical moments that changed the organization's trajectory. We will be forever grateful to her for believing in the importance of the AHS on gardening and

horticulture in the U.S. We would not be the organization we are without her. Her leadership and dedication to River Farm, especially in the wake of the pandemic, were inspirational."

Folsom retired in 2023 after serving for many years as the director of the gardens at the Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens in San Marino, California. A botanist with a special interest in the orchid family, Folsom did extensive field work in Central and South America early in his career and published his research in a wide range of scientific and popular publications. He was named the AHS's Liberty Hyde Bailey Award winner in 2020.

Arborcrest Gardens (Boone, NC) Nestled in downtown Boone, the 26-acre botanical garden features diverse flora, including a well-tended vegetable garden and greenhouse. Known for its plant evaluation program, the garden offers in-

sights into plant varieties and gardening practices. Visitors can take walking tours or reserve guided riding tours for a more immersive experience.

Draves Arboretum (Darien, NY) Draves Arboretum includes a 1.75-acre pond surrounded by over 800 species of trees. The Arboretum annually offers diverse educational programs for the western New York green industry, and it serves as a public regional learning station. The Arboretum models the possibilities that unique and unusual plants bring to a landscape.

Bard Arboretum (Annandale on Hudson, NY) Comprising over 1,000 acres along the historic Hudson River with trees over 200 years old, the Bard Arboretum serves as both a place for enjoyment and a living classroom. The campus encompasses a dramatic natural landscape of forested bluffs and ravines, with forests lining the stream corridors that wind their way to the Hudson River. In addition to this natural setting, the character of Bard is defined by the historic farms and estates on campus.

University of Guelph Arboretum (Guelph, ON, Canada) This arboretum on the campus of the University of Guelph features 400 acres of plant collections, gardens, trails, woodlands, wetlands, and meadows. The grounds focus on native Ontario trees and are home to more than 2000 taxa of woody plants and collections of oaks, beeches, maples, and conifers.

Aldersgate Public Garden (Lincoln, NE) Aldersgate benefits the environment and serves the community by providing a habitat for wildlife and a space to experience immersion in na-

ture. The garden includes 135 trees, nearly 850 shrubs, and 2,500 perennials.

Salisbury University Arboretum (Salisbury, MD) Located on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, this arboretum holds some of the most horticulturally diverse plantings in the region. When the university was founded in 1925, students celebrated Arbor Day by planting linden (Tilia spp.) trees in front of Holloway Hall, sowing the seeds of the arboretum. Today, the 200-acre campus showcases over 3,000 trees and an extensive inventory of woody and herbaceous species.

NEW NATIVE PLANT GARDEN AT RIVER FARM

A new garden showcasing native plants in a traditional Virginia landscape has been created at the AHS's River Farm headquarters. Inspired by the backyard of a beloved gardener, the Clara **B. Plein Memorial Garden** was officially unveiled on June 7.

"The Memorial Garden is a tremendous palette of plantings that is definitive of both our cultural and natural past," says Scott Plein, Chair of the AHS Board of Directors and grandson of Clara B. Plein. "It pays homage to River Farm's history as part of George Washington's original farmland and exemplifies the AHS's focus on best gardening practices."

The garden's plantings include 2,400 individual plants representing 30 native species. Plants were selected for their ability to support pollinators, create habitat, improve air and soil quality, and produce food. The garden's layout was thoughtfully planned around existing large trees, and plantings are layered to provide year-round interest through varied colors, textures, and branching structures.

The garden reflects a collaborative achievement made possible with generous funding from the White House Farm Foundation, a nonprofit organization headquartered in Bristow, Virginia. In all, 14 area companies leveraged their landscape design and installation capabilities to transform the area into an ecologically conscious oasis.

"This stunning new garden showcases how Virginia's gardening legacy can inspire landscapes that are not only visually captivating, but also resilient and environmentally conscious," says AHS President Suzanne Laporte. "We are proud to add the Clara B. Plein Memorial Garden to the rich horticultural experiences available to visitors of our headquarters."
