



NEW AHS GARDENING BOOKS ANNOUNCED

The American Horticultural Society is pleased to announce that pre-orders are now available for two new AHS books being released next year as part of a new publishing collaboration with Cool Springs Press.

The *American Horticultural Society Essential Guide to Organic Vegetable Gardening*, which will be released in January 2025, offers indispensable insight into growing a modern edible garden at home, regardless of whether home is in the





desert Southwest, the Midwestern plains, or on the shores of New England. Starting with a unique look at the history of vegetable gardening in North America, from indigenous cultures to Victory Gardeners to today's biodiversity-nurturing growers,

the book then digs into everything you need to know to cultivate a successful and productive vegetable garden without synthetic pesticides or fertilizers.

Hard on its heels, in February 2025, comes the *American Horticultural Society Essential Guide to Perennial Gardening*. This is a comprehensive and modern guide to cultivating and caring for herbaceous perennial plants and grasses, including many native to North America. Whether you grow in full sun or a shady corner, in a small space or a large landscape, the insight and guidance provided in this book will inspire a thriving, bloom-filled garden. This book contains all the information you need to grow perennials successfully in the face of today's many gardening challenges, including weather extremes, invasive pests, and water-use restrictions. Its progressive approach to perennial gardening focuses on treating the garden as an ecosystem that depends less on human interference and more on natural resiliency.


Two new staff members joined the AHS this summer. **Rochelle Greayer** joins the AHS as Editor of *The American Gardener*, the organization's bimonthly maga-


This year's five winners, announced during the AHS's 2024 National Children & Youth Garden Symposium at Chicago

NEW GARDENS IN THE AHS NETWORK

Three new gardens joined the AHS Reciprocal Garden Network over the summer: Waterfront Botanical Gardens. Conservation Garden Park, and the Botanical Garden of the Piedmont. These gardens join over 380 gardens around North America that offer free admission and other benefits to AHS members. Waterfront Botanical Gardens (Louisville, KY) is an urban garden being built on top of a former landfill. The Gardens opened in 2019 with five acres of the full 23-acre site developed. The Gardens feature the Graeser Family Education Center, Beargrass Creek Pathway, and a bonsai display.

With more than 8 acres of exhibits, pathways and plants, Conservation Garden Park (Salt Lake City, UT) is Salt Lake County's premier destination for learning about Utah's unique climate. Visitors can walk through a water pipe, explore a fullscale Localscape, see thousands of Utah-friendly plants, and learn how to create and maintain a water-efficient landscape.

Botanical Garden of the Piedmont (Charlottesville, VA) is a 15-acre native plant garden less than two miles from the heart of Charlottesville. Current projects in this newly opened garden include a stream restoration and a wildflower meadow.
