

#### **DIGITAL AHS MEMBERSHIP CARDS DEBUT IN 2025**

Starting in January, AHS Members will receive digital membership cards via email in place of paper cards through the mail. The new digital membership cards will provide quick and convenient



access to your membership information when visiting participants in the AHS Garden Network.

AHS Members who already have an email address on file will be receiving an email with a link to download their new digital cards. Once downloaded, the personalized, non-transferable cards can be stored in either Apple Wallet or Google Wallet. Your digital cards will be updated automatically when you renew your AHS membership,

which will help save time and printing, paper, and postage costs.

### **NEW GARDENS IN THE AHS NETWORK**

Three new gardens joined the AHS Garden Network this past fall: Juniper Level Botanic Garden, Rest-Stop-Ranch, and Moore Farms Botanical Garden. These gardens join over 380 gardens around North America that offer free admission and other benefits to AHS members. Established in 1986, **Juniper Level Botanic Garden** in Raleigh, North Carolina, is a 28-acre not-for-profit private research and botanic garden with over 28,000 different plants.



The garden's mission focuses on ex-situ plant conservation, research, education, breeding, propagation, and plant distribution. With 10 acres of display gardens, Juniper Level promotes botanical diversity along with appropriate cultural practices. Plant combinations using color, texture, and form to accent each plant's best characteristics create aesthetic views in the garden during each season of the year.

#### **Gardening in America**

Course access from mid-September to mid-February

**Rest-Stop-Ranch** in Massachusetts is a 4-acre accessible garden designed to provide a therapeutic and inclusive space for long-term caregivers and care-receivers, especially those with mobility challenges. The site features ADA-compliant trails, sensory gardens, and a variety of themed flower festivals, including the Bulb Parade in April, Lilac Festival in May, Rose Festival in June, and Lily Festival in July. Programs include Sunday Strolls, Memory Café events, and hands-on horticultural activities. The gardens are open to visitors by appointment or during public events.



Moore Farms Botanical Garden's mission is to promote research and education in horticulture, agriculture, and forestry for the benefit of the people of South Carolina and beyond. Located near Lake City, the garden is a non-profit organization committed to creating gardens that inform, inspire, and delight. Collection highlights include southern heritage plants and native plants. By combining cutting-edge horticultural practices and rural gardening traditions, they are reinterpreting what it means to be a southern garden.
